This film featuring the Ontario Turtle Conservation Centre has played at film festivals all over the world and has won 10 awards at various festivals including Best Canadian Short at Planet In Focus, Best in Festival at Yorkton Film Festival, and Best Documentary at Scinema Australia.

The festival premiere was at the prestigious Environmental Film Festival in Washington DC and has screened at the largest Documentary festival in the United States; Doc NYC. It has also played

We feel very fortunate to be internationally showcased in such a beautiful film. It documents the heart and soul of our mission and the people who work and volunteer here.

Volunteer Spotlight

About six years ago, Wendy Fucile started volunteering with us and since then, hasn't looked back! She persevered when the Centre was located in a two-storey building, and cleaned turtles by lugging pails of water up and down the stairs. Now, Wendy can be found feeding in our snapping turtle and hospital areas. The turtles recognize her voice and know that they'll soon be getting a meal! She was a great help this summer during the frenzied hatching season, checking each bin for newly emerged turtles, weighing, measuring and getting them into new habitats.

Wendy is "mostly retired" from a nursing career in community and mental health, where she held a variety of leadership positions. She was the first Dean of Trent Fleming School of Nursing and still teaches part-time. Wendy and her husband are long-time residents of Peterborough and her children live in British Columbia and Switzerland.

Wendy says that the neat thing about working with turtles is that her friends get enthusiastic too and therefore the OTCC community is enlarged. People who know that she volunteers here often ask for advice on how to protect turtles. Her entire family help spread the news by wearing OTCC T-shirts! She finds great satisfaction in her volunteer work and says that the staff is very accommodating when life takes you away from your position – volunteers are very supported.

We wouldn't survive without volunteers like Wendy, and we have 750+ turtles who think so too!

Hospital

In 2017 we released a total of 1,382 adult turtles and hatchlings!

While the busy 2017 season is over, our hospital still houses about 150 injured adult turtles that are in various stages of recovery, as well as over 600 hatchlings. These turtles still require daily care to get them ready for release. We will be releasing almost all of these as soon as the weather is warm.

As a result of the high numbers of turtles brought to the centre last year and the overcrowding, a decision was made to increase our floor space to accommodate injured turtles in 2018. This will become an addition to our ICU.

Anticipating the number of intakes for 2018 is impossible, but as we become more widely known across the entire province and even into Quebec, Dr. Carstairs and the Board of Directors felt this to be a very necessary addition. The overcrowding last season made the tasks of feeding and cleaning a very challenging indeed! Thanks to our amazing staff and volunteers, however, everyone stayed in good humour throughout, and we were successful in never turning away a turtle!


